For, if the miracles that were performed in you had been performed in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago, sitting in sackcloth and ashes. 14 However, it will be more bearable for Tyre and Sidon at the judgment than for you. <sup>15</sup> As for you, Capernaum, you will not be **lifted up to** heaven, will you? # THE WAR HAS ALREADY BEEN WON Sermon for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Pentecost, 2025 Luke 10:1-20

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. Amen.

The text for our sermon today is our Gospel read before, Luke 10:1-20 Lord God, heavenly Father, sanctify us through Your truth, Your Word is truth. Amen.

Dear friends in Christ,

The AELC has rightly said in the past that we seek to be a mission-minded church. With the Apostle Paul, we, too, have the desire to tell others of "Christ crucified" (1 Cor. 1:23). The sole mission of the church is to join with John the Baptist, pointing people to Christ, and saying, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29).

Today, from Luke's Gospel, we see the *urgency* with which Jesus Himself continues this message. Previously, Jesus had sent out the twelve, and now today He broadens His gospel outreach by sending out another seventy-two workers to proclaim the message, "**The kingdom of God has come near**."

The Saviour of mankind has arrived—the One whom not only John the Baptist, but all the prophets of the Old Testament had pointed to. Unfortunately, as you read through the Old Testament Scriptures, a common theme emerges: those privileged to hear about the coming Saviour often rejected the message of His prophets. Now today, even as Jesus Himself has arrived, people still reject Him. This is no surprise. Remember from last Sunday's Gospel how we discussed that we can sometimes hesitate to listen to the Lord when He asks us to "Follow Him," and today, as difficult as it is to admit, we often reject God's will for our lives. Nevertheless, it is truly encouraging to see that Jesus does not give up, but continues to reach out with compassion through the Gospel ministry He established.

As Jesus made His way to Jerusalem, it became increasingly evident that a vast number of people were prospects for the kingdom of God. Samaria was an entirely new mission field. There, Jesus saw a world full of lost, confused, and troubled souls, weighed down by their sins and shortcomings. Instead of condemning them, He recognised an opportunity. Jesus saw a harvest of souls ripe to be saved for the kingdom of God, a harvest that needed to happen now. So Jesus turns to His followers and says: "The harvest is great, but the labourers are few. Therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into His harvest!"

Harvesting for the kingdom of God would be a huge task, and there were few workers available to proclaim God's message. Jesus compares it to harvesting ripe grain. No matter how great the harvest, the crop will be small *if there are few workers*.

Furthermore, to be a harvester for God's kingdom was difficult work. Jesus had earlier laid strict demands on those who would follow. Proclaiming the kingdom of God called for dedication and commitment that, unfortunately, too few people had. Yet there were some ready for this task of harvesting. The Lord "appointed seventy-two other men and sent them out in pairs to go ahead of Him to every city and place where He Himself was intending to go." These appointees were in addition to the apostles. The work of harvesting was not limited to just the Twelve because it was too big a job.

These words must surely serve as an important reminder to us all that the work of the church, especially the task of sharing the Good News, is the responsibility of every Christian. After all, surely with God, we all desire that more people come to know the truth and be saved.<sup>2</sup> This is what we pray in the Lord's Prayer: we ask for His kingdom to come and His will to be done. This prayer is partly fulfilled when people hear the Gospel message and believe in Jesus as their Saviour.

I am sure that we all know someone who isn't yet a believer, and we hope and pray that the Holy Spirit will work in that person to soften his hardened heart and lead him to receive the Lord. Perhaps we pray that, with God's help, *someone* one day will be able to change that person. That is commendable, but why someone else? Don't *you* have the opportunity and responsibility to do exactly what you're praying for? When you pray for such people, and the Lord hears your prayer, He responds with the words, "Go! Look! I am sending you." "I have given you a voice, use it!"

But you know what happens. We make excuses. "But Lord, I'm no good at such things. I don't know what to say. I don't really know the Scriptures that well and am worried that I'd get things mixed up and make a fool of myself, making matters worse." But such excuses are only smokescreens for what we are thinking, which is, "I'm scared that I'll be rejected and humiliated. If I say something, they'll probably think I am some kind of religious nutcase."

That is a real possibility, perhaps even a probability. When you share Christ with the world, you can expect to be treated as such. Remember, we live in a world that is increasingly hostile to Christ, and so we would prefer to pray *about it* safely rather than serve the Lord by *doing so*, and I guess it doesn't help our confidence when Jesus warns us, "I am sending you out <u>like lambs among wolves</u>."

"Lambs among wolves" doesn't sound very comforting. Being a lamb among a pack of wolves is not something anyone would want to go through. That's probably why, while we desire more people to be saved, we often hope it will be someone else who preaches the Good News so we don't get hurt. We all want to live peacefully with one another, and so, we tend to avoid sharing the Good News because it could bring <a href="https://linear.com/hostility">hostility</a>. So, when we pray to the Lord, asking Him to send workers, and He replies, "Okay, you get busy," but then adds, "You're about to be attacked," what kind of answer can we give to the Lord for His command to "Go!"

If we desire to listen to the Lord's command, are willing to speak up, and accept what often happens when speaking the Lord's Word in a hostile world, can we still find a bit of peace and quiet to make our task a little easier? Yes, we can. Let me ask you, "Where does genuine peace and quiet come from?"

Well, consider what it truly means to be "lambs among wolves." Left entirely to themselves, what can lambs do if wolves surround them? Absolutely nothing. They can't run or defend themselves, and so remain frightened and probably ready to die a horrible death unless they can find a place out of reach of the wolves, a safe and secure spot... like, say, in the arms of a shepherd, who carries a big stick that the wolves know will be used against them if they get too close. That's the key, and that is what we confess in Psalm 23: "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want." And then it goes on to say, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I shall fear no evil." Why not? "For You are with me. Your rod and staff comfort me."

That is to say, a lamb finds its peace and quietness not in external circumstances—they're dark and threatening. No, a lamb looks to its Shepherd and knows, "As long as I'm close to Him, no harm can come to me." In fact, the worse the threats are, the closer the lamb will stay to the Shepherd, and that's the point of the answer to our prayer. By sending us out as "lambs among wolves," Christ compels us to stay close to Him, where nothing can harm us.

How do we do that? How do we stay close to Christ?

Jesus says, "The person who hears you hears Me." This is not a figure of speech. John begins his Gospel with these words: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1). Jesus is God in the flesh. So when you speak Christ's Word to someone, you are actually conveying Christ to them. Keeping this in mind and knowing that in times of trouble and fear we shall want to get closer to the Shepherd, it's clear that the way to do this is to get deeper in His Word. The Apostle Peter encourages us to be like newborn babies who "long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation" (1 Peter 2:2). We shall want to hear, study, and memorise the Word of God. In so doing, we come to know more completely how faithful, loving, and caring our Good Shepherd is, and how we, the lambs, are safely carried in the Shepherd's arms. Once we realise all this, and see the growling and snapping jaws of the wolves around us, we'll see that the dangers we face actually push us towards the Shepherd and His Word.

However, let's consider a more personal situation. What about you? Take a moment to reflect on how good and easy your life has been. Sure, we have all faced problems, and continue to do so today, but do any of us truly understand what actual persecution is? Has any of us here today truly experienced complete and utter despair, or many other troubling things, that have caused us to drift away from the Shepherd and His Word? Do you live your life according to the Word of God or the way of this world? What's easier: living God's way or the world's way? It's so sad and utterly unnecessary when many lambs are caught and killed before they even realise any threat.

Dear friends, today, we have been discussing how to share the Gospel of Christ with others in complete peace and security, *despite the daily threats and dangers we face*. When we are with Christ and safe in His saving Word, <u>nothing out there can cause us lasting harm</u>. That's why Jesus told the seventy-two, "**Do not carry a purse, or a bag, or sandals, and do not greet anyone on the road!**" The point was that He Himself would take care of all their needs. They were to rely solely on Him, not the world.

And Jesus did warn them that there would be victories and losses. "Whenever you go into a house, first say, 'Peace to this house!' <sup>6</sup> If a man of peace is there, let your peace rest on him; but, if not, it will return to you. <sup>7</sup> Stay in the same house and eat and drink what they give! For a worker is worthy of his wages. Do not move around from one house to another! <sup>8</sup> Whenever you go into a city and the people welcome you, eat what is set before you! <sup>9</sup> Heal the sick that are in it, and tell the people, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you'! <sup>10</sup> However, whenever you go into a city and they do not welcome you, go out on its streets and say, <sup>11</sup> 'We are wiping off against you even the dust of your city that has clung to our feet! Nevertheless, realise this: The kingdom of God has come near you'!"

Some would receive their message with joy, others would not. And since the message was Christ and His kingdom of grace, it was Christ and the kingdom that they received. Upon such people, the peace of God would remain—the peace of knowing that for Christ's sake sins are forgiven and that eternal life is assured. Others, however, would reject their message. They would not receive God's peace in Christ, but they were to be told nevertheless that God's kingdom was at hand: a message of comfort to those who enter inside, a message of warning to those who stubbornly persist to remain outside of it.

Our passage concludes today with, "the seventy-two men returned with joy. They said, "Lord, even the demons do what we tell them in Your name."

The seventy-two were absolutely thrilled over what they had accomplished, or to be more precise, what Christ had accomplished through them. "He replied to them, "I was watching Satan falling like lightning from heaven." Indeed, we can be sure that Satan is handed a defeat every time a sinner comes to repentance and to faith in Jesus, who suffered, died, and rose to give salvation and life to men. That's where the real victory is: on the cross. And that's why Jesus told the seventy-two not to rejoice over their individual battles with the forces of evil, but rather to rejoice that their names "have been written in heaven."

With the battles, there would be wins and losses that could lead to discouragement. So what Jesus told them to focus on was the fact that in Him the war has already been won.

That victory is what gives us joy, peace, and quietness of heart as we, too, head out as lambs among wolves to share the Gospel with those around us. Therefore, pray to the Lord of the harvest to send workers into His field, workers faithful and true, and each of us among them, and count it a joy that we've been privileged to share in this task of bringing the peace of Christ to the world. And above all, rejoice that because of Him and what He achieved for us on the cross, our names "have been written in heaven." To Him be all praise and glory forever. Amen.

The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ. Amen.
